PLAN MEMORIAL CEREMONIES TO Honor Pilsudski

Exercises Tomorrow to Be Followed by Others for a Month.

Civic memorial exercises and solemn religious ceremonies planned by organizations, churches and official representatives of the republic of Poland for Marshal Joseph Pilsudski will begin tomorrow night in the Holy Trinity high school auditorium, West Division and Cleaver streets. Tomorrow's memorial will be followed for one month by memorial tributes, exercises and religious ceremonies which are being arranged by various patriotic, educational, fraternal, ex-service veteran, singing and other organizations and by religious services in practically every place of worship attended by people of Polish ancestry.

In the gathering tomorrow officials of the Polish National Alliance, the Polish Roman Catholic Union, the Polish Alma Mater, the Polish Women's Alliance, the Alliance of the Podhalans, the veterans of the Polish legions, the veterans of the General Haller army and the United Polish Singers will take part.

On the Program.

The program will be opened by John Romaszkiewicz, president of the Polish National Alliance, and addresses will be made by Joseph Kania, president of the Polish Roman Catholic Union; by Miss A. Emily Napieralski, president of the Polish Women's Alliance; Albert Soska, president Polish Alma Mater; Henry Lokanski, president of the Podhalan Alliance; Dr. Casimir Zurawski, and Consul General of Poland Waclaw Gawronski.

The famous Polish legion song, "The First Brigade," which Marshall Pilsudski himself often said was his favorite, will be sung by the New Life choir; the Chopin funeral march will be played by the military band; the Ave Maria will be sung, and the Polish Youth Organization, the Harcerz, will sound taps. Two veterans of the Polish legion and two veterans of the General Haller army will act as guard of honor at the illuminated life-size portrait of Marshal Pilsudski on the stage. On the day of the funeral of Marshal Pilsudski, arranged by the consul general of Poland, will be the official solemn requiem high mass to which the entire consular corps of all foreign countries, all public officals of the federal, state, county and municipal governments and prominent citizens will be invited by the consul general. Arrangements for this official service will be carired out by the consul general at Chicago in accordance with the plans of the Polish ambassador in Washington, which are to be uniform throughout the country.

Solemn Requiem Mass.

Headed by the Rt.-Rev. Msgr. Thomas P. Bona, the pastor of parishes of Americans of Polish descent are planning to have a solemn requiem mass for the repose of the soul of Marshal Pilsudski celebrated on a fixed day in every one of their churches and also in the St. Hedwig's Polish orphanage, the St. Mary of Nazareth hospital chapel and in the various convents and institutions of learning. The date for these religious services will be fixed later.

In memoriam resolutions have been adopted, signed and issued in their official publications by the grand officers of the various fraternal and patriotic bodies of Americans of Polish descent which have their headquarters in Chicago. In these resolutions every society, branch, division and lodge is directed to arrange special memorial exercises and also to arrange for requiem services in all the churches.
