PILSUDSKI TO REST IN TOMB OF KINGS

Body Will Be Taken to Cracow
—Heart Goes to Wilno, Brain
to Science Institute.

GENERALS LIKELY TO RULE

Newspapers Stress That Nation
Must Take Responsibilities
the Marshal Carried.

WARSAW, May 13.—The death of Marshal Josef Pilsudski yesterday was a personal loss for millions of Poles. The mourning is general. Theatres will be closed till after the funeral. Music will not be played in restaurants or night clubs or on the radio.

The official mourning for the army and civil service will last six weeks, during which even private parties may not be held. All newspapers appear with black borders.

The funeral arrangements have not been announced but it is planned to take the body to Cracow to rest in a silver and glass coffin in the tomb of Poland's kings in Wawel Cathedral, the ancient royal castle. It is understood this was the Marshal's wish.

He desired that his heart should be taken to Wilno, his native city, to rest where his mother is buried. He ordered that his brain should go to the Wilno Institute for Scientific Research.

Heart and Brain Removed.

Carrying out his wishes, doctors removed the heart and brain. The body will lie in state in Warsaw Cathedral. The coffin will not be ready until tomorrow night, so the body, in Marshal's uniform with decorations, rests in a little drawing room in Belvedere Palace where the Marshal used to drink tea, smoke innumerable cigarettes and play solitaire. His old soldiers form a guard of honor.

There will be three funeral ceremonies, one in Warsaw, another in Cracow and a third in Wilno for the heart. The Warsaw ceremony probably will be held Saturday. It has been suggested that the body be taken by rail only to Kielec and that the last fifty miles to Cracow be covered in a procession along the road on which the first detachment of the Pilsudski legions rode during the war.

It is certain no successor can be found. The last nine years of the Polish regime have been entirely the Marshal's. He died on the ninth anniversary of his march on Warsaw which made him dictator.

In this crisis the country's thoughts turn to General Edward Rydz-Smidly, the new Inspector General of the army. The Marshal designated him as his successor as Inspector General. He was the leader of the Pilsudski legions when the Marshal was Germany's prisoner in 1917.

The general is modest and rather shy, but is a great moral force in the country. He has not belonged to the cabinet since he has ruled Poland during the last six years. It is believed that the

not even Colonel Lawrence himself was quite certain. One close friend said last night he might have chosen to lead a youths' movement, for his name was magic to the young people of England and he felt youth was being wasted in the post-war world.

He might have returned to politics in the guise of a radical reformer, although none of the established political parties or movements attracted him. He had bitter contempt for the pomp of power and for the vanity of politicians, but he had decidedly radical opinions which might have found an outlet somehow. He was thinking, too, of making himself more active as a writer whose prose had already become classic English literature. The profits from his book, "Revolt in the Desert," he gave for the most part to military charities, but he had a small income of between £200 and £300 a year, which was more than he needed.

DISSENSION IN POLAND IS FEARED BY FRENCH

Death of Pilsudski Is Believed
to Have Removed a Strong
Influence for Stability.

PARIS, May 13.—The death of Marshal Josef Pilsudski, Polish dictator, is not considered in France as likely to have any immediate effect. The French believe, however, that his demise removes an element of stability. For even though of late Paris had been far from approving the Marshal's policy toward Germany and Russia, as long as he was the real head of his government some confidence could be felt regarding Poland's internal and external situation.

Now, it is feared, Poland may be on the verge of a scene of internal dissension with the consequent weakening of her influence and importance in international affairs.

The visit of Foreign Minister Pierre Laval to Warsaw last week has been vigorously commented on here. It was especially noted that his speeches and declarations were much warmer in tone than the replies of Colonel Josef Beck, Polish foreign minister. There has been some criticism also of the failure to mark the Marshal's death.

U. S. CONDOLENCES SENT TO POLAND

Secretary Hull Says Pilsudski Had Won Admiration Here for His Great Labors.

POPE PRAYS FOR MARSHAL

Hungarian Premier Pays Tribute to Statesman as 'Noble Friend' of Budapest.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—A message of condolence on the death of Marshal Pilsudski was sent today by Secretary of State Hull to Josef Beck, Foreign Minister of Poland.

"I have learned with distress of the death of Marshal Josef Pilsudski and I offer Your Excellency my sincere condolences of the government and people of the United States. We in America have always had a particular admiration for the high qualities which enabled Marshal Pilsudski to labor so persistently and so successfully for the independence of his country. We share your grief that his career is ended."

Gombocz Lauds Marshal

BUDAPEST, May 13.—Speaking in Parliament today Premier Gombocz stressed Marshal Pilsudski's great share in the friendship between Poland and Hungary, adding that Hungary would "never forget her noble friend."

Prague Praises Pilsudski

PRAGUE, May 13.—President Masaryk sent condolences on Marshal Pilsudski's death to Warsaw today. His press comments stress the Marshal's work in the resurrection of the Polish State.

HITLER'S POSTPONING OF ARMS TALK SEEN

Death of Pilsudski Is Likely to Delay Reichsfuehrer's Speech on Germany's Policy.

BERLIN, May 13.—The first exterior consequence of Marshal Josef Pilsudski's death seems likely to be the postponement of the crucial speech on Germany's international policy which Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler planned to deliver before the specially assembled Reichstag late this week.

The date therefor had been set tentatively for Friday. However, the uncertainty attending the obsequies for the Polish dictator, which promise to be long drawn out, prevented telegrams summoning the Reichstag from being sent out today.

Normally the call would have been issued, but there is every natural hesitation here about staging a declaration of international policy upon a day when one of the chief factors in that policy is being laid in his grave. With Friday the probable day of the burial, Herr Hitler's speech will likely be postponed until next Monday.

It is greatly desired in Britain that the speech be delivered before the great debate upon British national defense which takes place in the House of Commons next Tuesday, because the tenor of the speeches then to be delivered will depend very much upon what Herr Hitler has previously said.

Yet such a delay in an utterance of precisely what Germany will and will not do to reach an agreement with her neighbors in the matter of armaments will be welcomed here. Every day's delay is a gain for Germany, because German prepara-

tions are that much further ahead and Germany is therefore able to take a stronger attitude.

However, all information, such as it is, tends to the effect that the Fuehrer desires in this speech to strike a conciliatory note.

Flandin Returns to Paris Home

PARIS, May 13 (AP).—Premier Pierre-Etienne Flandin, who has sufficiently recovered from injuries suffered in an automobile accident to leave the hospital, returned to the Premier's residence today. He is expected to preside over Wednesday's Cabinet session.

Debuchi to Visit Australia

TOKYO, May 13 (AP).—Katsujirō Debuchi, former Ambassador to the United States, was named today to head the good-will mission that Japan will send to Australia in mid-July in an effort, the Foreign Office announced, to hasten conclusion of the commercial treaty now under negotiation.

M'DONALD ON WAY HERE.

Leaves Argentina After Trying to Place German Refugees.

Special Cable to THE NEW YORK TIMES. BUENOS AIRES, May 13.—James G. McDonald, League of Nations High Commissioner for Refugees from Germany, left today for Montevideo after a three weeks' stay here during which he conferred with Argentine Government authorities regarding the possibility of bringing to Argentina some of the many thousands of families which have fled from Nazi Germany.

He said he found the Argentine officials sympathetic, but that no definite arrangements had been completed. After a two days' visit in Uruguay he will proceed to Rio de Janeiro. He plans to sail for New York from Rio de Janeiro on May 23.



...belong to the colonel's group that has ruled Poland during the last six years. It is being said that the colonels are likely to go out and the generals are likely to come in.
Another possible leader is General Sosnowski, who shared Marshal Pilsudski's cell in a German prison for several months. Like General Rydz-Smidly and the new provisional War Minister, General Tadeusz Kasprzycki, he never left the army for politics. General Sosnowski is interested in foreign politics and is pro-French.

Colonel Josef Beck, Foreign Minister, knew during his recent conversations with Pierre Laval, French Foreign Minister, that the Marshal was dying. In this situation Colonel Beck tried to reaffirm the alliance with France, but would not commit himself to any new pact proposals or anything that might appear as a change in the Polish foreign policy.

President Has Great Power.

The President of the republic, Professor Ignaz Moscicki, who hitherto considered himself as Marshal Pilsudski's subordinate and remained in the background, may now become a great political force, because under the new Constitution he wields an absolute monarch's power.

The Kuryer Warszawski, a moderate newspaper opposed to the Pilsudski regime, says the Marshal's great burden now falls on the whole nation.

"The Polish people will not be led in the future by the strong force of a single individual," it continues. "There is no such man in Poland and the nation would not like to adopt a system of one-man leadership. Poland enters a new period of wider, fuller responsibility."

The official Gazeta Polska says: "The immense burden carried by Josef Pilsudski is now transferred to the nation, to every one of us. The grave responsibility for Poland's destiny, the cross which Pilsudski voluntarily carried on his shoulders for all other Poles, can now only be supported by millions of willing hands."

The men of the régime were not taken by surprise by Marshal Pilsudski's death. When the doctors discovered three months ago that the Marshal had cancer the leaders of the Pilsudski party hastened to revision of the Constitution and prepared for new elections.

The Marshal suffered much in the last few weeks. For a long time fruit, vegetables and tea had been his only food. Recently he took only milk and a little dry bread.

Always a rebellious patient, he refused to be X-rayed, which explains why the cancer was discovered so late. It was almost impossible to get him to take medicine.

Special stamps, with Marshal Pilsudski's portrait in a black frame, were issued today.

Widow Seriously Ill.

WARSAW, May 13.—Mme. Alexandra Pilsudska, widow of Marshal Pilsudski, was in a serious condition today after suffering from a heart attack. Physicians described her condition as "unsatisfactory."

The marshal's long illness, it was said, affected her health. Physicians said she had been without sleep since Friday and had suffered an overstrain of her nerves and heart which caused her collapse after the marshal's death.

FRENCH LEFT PARTIES GAIN IN LOCAL VOTING

Communists Show Increases Because Socialists Backed Them to Beat 'Fascists.'

PARIS, May 13.—An analysis of the results of the municipal elections held during the past two Sundays throughout France shows that while in the cities and working class districts there were considerable Communist gains, the country as a whole remained loyal to its old party divisions.

Most of the Communist successes were due to Socialists who voted for Communists to prevent the success of "Fascist" candidates.

Throughout the country the Radical Socialists remain the principal party, with 221 seats. Next come the Socialists with 168 seats and the Left Republicans with 145 seats.

Despite the agitation by the Nationalist parties following the disturbances in February, 1934, they lost more seats than they won, so the Left's contention that it won a victory seems justified.

...some criticism also of the failure to mark M. Laval's arrival by any popular reception, which was a strong contrast to that accorded him in Moscow today.

Recent observers who have visited Poland say that the dominating sentiment is mistrust of the Soviet and that it is that alone which has actuated a closer tie-up with Germany in the last two years. While the Marshal was in authority such singleness of policy was possible. With his death it is feared that pro-Russian, pro-German and pro-French parties will start struggling for control.
